

Lunch is not what it used to be when I was a kid, nor are the lunch ladies. You envision cranky old grey haired ladies, but not here in Buckner. These dedicated ladies enjoy their job and are proud of the Lunch Lady name. It is their job to make sure that every child is provided nutritious meals each day

They arrive at the cafeteria around 5 a.m. to prepare breakfast and then start work on lunch. Most kids seem to like to eat their apples when they are cut up, so the ladies make a point of cutting up the apples for the kids. If a particular child does not like the entree like chicken fried steak, then they can have a peanut butter and jelly sandwich instead. They want the kids to eat a good meal and enjoy it at the same time. Each year the ladies make a point of learning the names of every child in the school and of course each child knows all the lunch ladies. This bond makes the kids feel special. Each child has a number and is in the computer called Meal Pay, which tells the cashier if they have lunch money in their account. Even if they don't have money credited to their account they are allowed to charge their lunch for several days and a note goes home to the parents.

With Meal Pay you can put money on your child's account via the internet or you can use an e-check. With this system you can see when you need to add more money and you can also see what your child ate that day. If money is left over at the end of the school year, it remains in the Meal Pay system for next year.

The days of preparing the same old bland food each day is long gone. Lunch Ladies now upgrade their skills with continuous training on new technology and nutrition. Nationals is where these ladies get their training. To afford this, these ladies do fund raisers all year long

Up Stream Number 844 rolls through Buckner!

Anxious individuals waited in anticipation for Union Pacific Railroad's legendary steam locomotive No. 844 to roll through Buckner. The locomotive was traveling from Cheyenne Wyo. to Marion Ark. pulling a special 150th Anniversary Commemoration Civil War Troop Train with nearly 300 war historians from the Midwest on their journey to participate in the 150th Anniversary Battle of Shiloh Reenactment as hosted by the Blue Gray Alliance near the Shiloh National Military Park. Some civil war historians joined the train in Kansas City for the trip to Marion, Ark.

The Gazette staff was waiting for the train on Lake City Rd. between Buckner and Lake City. Around 9:40 we could hear the very distinctive steam train whistle, which was music to everyone's ears, as they turned their heads to the west to see the train approaching Buckner. Tri pods were set up, video cameras and camera men and women were ready to catch that historic moment in time. As the majestic train passed in front of us, cameras were flashing and all eyes were focused on this historic event. The second the train was out of site, anxious railroad fans literally jumped into their vehicles and sped down the road, chasing after the train.



Steam engine No. 844 stopped in Buckner last year for a whistle stop and is the last steam engine built for Union Pacific in operation.

Union Pacific Railroad would like to recognize the fact that on this 150th Anniversary of that event. 

Rumor has it that a 102 year old lady in Buckner is getting a face lift...who is it?

The secret is out and it is the talk of the town! A beautiful 102 year old lady is getting a much needed face lift. It seems that over the years her complexion has faded a little and some lines were showing in her face. In early March a strong wind swooped down and literally took the top of her head off. Now chicken little has been yelling, "The sky is falling, the sky is falling," when in essence he means the parapet has fallen onto her roof.

By now, most of you know I am talking about the beautiful old building located at the corners of Washington street and S. Hudson in downtown Buckner. Yes, in March, the 47 plus mile an hour wind literally blew the top part of the building, called the parapet down and it landed on the roof. Not one brick fell on the ground, which was a real blessing. After a structural engineer and construction and roofing company examined the building, it was determined that the outer layer of brick, on the south wall, also called brick veneer, needed to be replaced. The bricks that are seen on the road were taken from the south side of the building and new ones will be added shortly. The 102 year old bricks will be reused on different projects in the area. None will be taken to the landfill.

The beautiful old lady will have a magnificent face lift. Now the question is, should they go with red brick veneer or purple? I am all for purple, how about you!



Buckner City News

The Board of Aldermen approved removing brush and trees along the South bank of Fire Prairie Creek behind the park in an effort to help alleviate flooding. The area was also graded so that crews could mow the grass.

A representative from the Senior Center asked the board for \$5,000 to help keep the Senior Center open until the end of their fiscal year. He reported that they receive free rent from the lodge but the center does pay for utilities and insurance. The board approved.

Continuing with the swimming pool versus spray park issue, present park board member Amber West asked the board if the park board could revisit the issue. Ed Burns past park board member said that they have worked on the spray park project for 6 months and thinks it is a good deal. The board moved to table the motion.

The board is still considering different options for street repairs in an attempt to repair as many streets as possible with the available funds and also protect newer streets from deterioriating with sealant.

Mayor Hickson stated in the Admin and Finance committee meeting February 2, 2012 that there was discussion about the problems with parking court nights and holding space for prisoners. The Mayor appointed a municipal building subcommittee consisting of Aldermen Litten, Alderman Box, Bobby Dean, Kirk Kellough and Mike Larkin.

During the candidate forum on March 26 at the Elementary School, most candidates in attendance agreed with the basic concepts. All were in favor of attracting new businesses to town and working on a plan to find alternatives to the youth of our community for a place to go. Unfortunately there is no easy or quick fix to either of these issues, and all agreed that this needs to be explored. Those candidates in attendance were:



Union Pacific Railroad Museum

The Union Pacific Railroad Museum is taking its Building America exhibit on the road, or at least out on the rails. The Promontory, a Union Pacific Railroad 1962-vintage baggage car, has been transformed into a state-of-the-art traveling museum. Complete with 13 large, dramatic graphics and the latest in interactive touch video screen technology, the Promontory will immerse visitors in Union Pacific's 150-year history.

The traveling exhibit is a smaller version of the Building America exhibit that will open at the Union Pacific Railroad Museum in Council Bluffs, Iowa, on May 12, 2012.

Traveling exhibit visitors will have an opportunity to interact with history via a 65-inch touch video screen highlighting many of the 27 communities the car will be visiting in 2012. The video screen features an interactive map showing the Union Pacific system from 1869 to the present. The 150-year railroad timeline, from 1862 to present, also is available in a touch screen kiosk.

Several artifacts from the Union Pacific Railroad Museum will be on display, including:

Archaeological finds from Ft. McPherson, Neb., which was built to protect construction crews from attacks by Great Plains tribal bands;

Replicas of the Golden and Arizona spikes, presented at Promontory Summit, Utah, in 1869;

Several railroad construction tools and remnants from 1862-1869; and

Stereo cards from Union Pacific's collection that when viewed through a special device renders them in 19th Century 3-D.

About the Promontory baggage car

The Promontory was built in 1962 by the St. Louis Car Company as postal storage car No. 5779. It is the newest car in Union Pacific's Heritage Passenger Fleet and was renamed the Promontory in 1993. The car has carpeted walls that have enabled it to be used for displays on various special trains and at community celebrations. When not in use for displays, it is often equipped as an exercise car for long trips.

This car is named for Promontory Summit, Utah, just north of Great Salt Lake and the site selected for the joining of the Union Pacific and Central Pacific Railroads. Completion of the railroad-the greatest engineering feat of the 19th century-culminated in a celebration there on May 10, 1869. Promontory Point, often erroneously referred to as the location for the ceremony, juts out into the lake itself. It was the location of a saltworks for many years.

When Edward Harriman began the great rebuilding of the Harriman lines just after the turn of the century, the Lucin Cutoff was built across the Great Salt Lake, bypassing the original line through Promontory Summit. This was designed to move trains across Utah much faster and eliminate the old line around the northern edge of the lake. Promontory Point touches the Lucin Cutoff, and one of the steamboats used during its construction was named Promontory.

The original transcontinental line through Promontory was taken up for scrap in 1942

About the Union Pacific Railroad Museum

Visitors to the Union Pacific Railroad Museum journey through more than 150 years of American history while viewing one of the oldest corporate collections in the nation. Housed in the historic Carnegie Library building in Council Bluffs, Iowa, visitors discover an extensive compilation of artifacts, photographs, documents and equipment from our nation's most ambitious endeavors - constructing the transcontinental railroad and settling the West, simultaneously chronicled in museum exhibits. Among the most popular museum exhibits are the transcontinental railroad's construction; "America Travels by Rail," which celebrates the height of passenger travel; the Lincoln Collection, featuring artifacts from President Abraham Lincoln's rail car and funeral; and the technology and innovation that sustain Union Pacific as a railroad industry leader. The Union Pacific Railroad Museum also promotes a sense of connectedness shared by generations of people whose personal and family histories have been touched by the railroad.


