
My AMAZING grandmother Hellen Cook

From the heart of Sara Ellis

Yesterday (8/11/13) my family received a phone call from the Benton County Sheriff's Department concerning "significant findings" that had resulted from the day's search. We rushed into our cars to make the 2 hour drive from Buckner, MO to Warsaw, MO to be met with news that made our hearts sink but yet gave us a small bit of peace for the first time in 29 days. Though DNA identification is pending we believe that Hellen Cook is now in her forever home where she will no longer have to deal with the disease of Alzheimer's that has dramatically changed her life for the last 4 years. She gets to be with her son who died suddenly just 4 years ago.

Today Grandma's face is being flashed all over the news and on social media for the end of her life, I think it is important that the public be made aware of her entire life. There is no one like Hellen Cook. Her petite body was full of large, fiery personality. She was extremely smart and even held the I.Q. record for several years in the county she grew up in. Grandma is also known for her caring love. She loved children and could always be found talking or playing with a child. Hellen was also an outstanding nurse, being a director-of-nursing for the later 20 years of her nursing career. She was loved and admired by all who knew her. Her most memorable quality is her quick and clever wit. Her husband Howard says, "There has never gone a day when she hasn't made me laugh". Her most used witty saying was: "that's Hellen with 2 Ls, and don't you shorten it!"

The family is sorrowed to know that we have lost our fiery, intelligent, caring, and witty Hellen. We have searched relentlessly over the last 29 days and thank all the wonderful volunteers and media who have joined us in this search. Hellen leaves behind a Husband of 51 years, three children, 12 granchildren, and 2 great grandchildren. We will still continue Hellen's Heroes in hope of preventing another family from going through this nightmare. Below is a collage of pictures of Hellen throughout her life. Edward Neil Norman, passed away comfortably in his home in Levasy, Mo. on Friday, August 30, 2013 after battling cancer since January.



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Alzheimer's warning signs Page 5

Have you noticed any of these warning signs?

Please list any concerns you have and take this sheet with you to the doctor.

Note: This list is for information only and not a substitute for a consultation with a qualified professional.

1. Memory loss that disrupts daily life. One of the most common signs of Alzheimer's, especially in the early stages, is forgetting recently learned information. Others include forgetting important dates or events; asking for the same information over and over; relying on memory aides (e.g., reminder notes or electronic devices) or family members for things they used to handle on their own. What's typical? Sometimes forgetting names or appointments, but remembering them later.

2. Challenges in planning or solving problems. Some people may experience changes in their ability to develop and follow a plan or work with numbers. They may have trouble following a familiar recipe or keeping track of monthly bills. They may have difficulty concentrating and take much longer to do things than they did before. What's typical? Making occasional errors when balancing a checkbook.

3. Difficulty completing familiar tasks at home, at work or at leisure. People with Alzheimer's often find it hard to complete daily tasks. Sometimes, people may have trouble driving to a familiar location, managing a budget at work or remembering the rules of a favorite game. What's typical? Occasionally needing help to use the settings on a microwave or to record a television show.

4. Confusion with time or place. People with Alzheimer's can lose track of dates, seasons and the passage of time. They may have trouble understanding something if it is not happening immediately. Sometimes they may forget where they are or how they got there. What's typical? Getting confused about the day of the week but figuring it out later.

_____5. Trouble understanding visual images and spatial relationships. For some people, having vision problems is a sign of Alzheimer's. They may have difficulty reading, judging distance and determining color or contrast. In terms of perception, they may pass a mirror and think someone else is in the room. They may not recognize their own reflection. What's typical? Vision changes related to cataracts.

6. New problems with words in speaking or writing. People with Alzheimer's may have trouble following or joining a conversation. They may stop in the middle of a conversation and have no idea how to continue or they may repeat themselves. They may struggle with vocabulary, have problems finding the right word or call things by the wrong name (e.g., calling a watch a "hand clock"). What's typical? Sometimes having trouble finding the right word.

7. Misplacing things and losing the ability to retrace steps. A person with Alzheimer's disease may put things in unusual places. They may lose things and be unable to go back over their steps to find them again. Sometimes, they may accuse others of stealing. This may occur more frequently over time. What's typical? Misplacing things from time to time, such as a pair of glasses or the remote control.

8. Decreased or poor judgment. People with Alzheimer's may experience changes in judgment or decision making. For example, they may use poor judgment when dealing with money, giving large amounts to telemarketers. They may pay less attention to grooming or keeping themselves clean. What's typical? Making a bad decision once in a while.

_____9. Withdrawal from work or social activities. A person with Alzheimer's may start to remove themselves from hobbies, social activities, work projects or sports. They may have trouble keeping up with a favorite sports team or remembering how to complete a favorite hobby. They may also avoid being social because of the changes they have experienced. What's typical? Sometimes feeling weary of work, family and social obligations.

10. Changes in mood and personality. The mood and personalities of people with Alzheimer's can change. They can become confused, suspicious, depressed, fearful or anxious. They may be easily upset at home, at work, with friends or in places where they are out of their comfort zone. What's typical? Developing very specific ways of doing things and becoming irritable when a routine is disrupted.

If you have questions about any of these warning signs, the Alzheimer's Association recommends consulting a physician. Early diagnosis provides the best opportunities for treatment, support and future planning.

We Care About Our Senior Citizens

Buckner Masonic Lodge #501 has been the host location for the Buckner Senior Center for the last thirty-seven years and provides Northeast Jackson County seniors and disabled people a nutritious meal five days a week, as well as home delivered meals to shutins. During that time, the Buckner Area Community Service (BACS) has worked with the Mid-America Regional Council (MARC) who funded all expenses for the operation of the food and activity programs. Two years ago, MARC experienced a reduction of funding and we were informed they could no longer payroll the staff required to provide the service. This resulted in a potential of Buckner losing its Senior Program if we could not produce a sponsor who would fund the cost of staffing and managing the program in accordance with MARC's standards. The Board members of the Buckner Area Community Service stepped up to the challenge when faced with the threat of losing this valuable asset in the Buckner Community. They quickly mobilized key people in the community and coordinated with volunteers who agreed to staff and manage the center. Being relieved of the overhead for staffing, MARC was able to continue assisting by providing the meals and transportation. Over the last year, the Buckner Area Community Service, Inc. formally organized as a Missouri not-for-profit corporation and they applied for Internal Revenue

Service 501(c)(3) status. Early this year they received confirmation that their hard work paid off. BACS is now a not-forprofit tax-exempt corporation operating in conjunction with the Mid-America Regional Council and the Masonic Lodge. MARC recently announced that they will continue to assist in providing meals for at least another year and with the assistance of volunteers we are now entering our second year under this new arrangement.

However, even under this new arrangement, BACS will experience a \$12,000 shortfall if no other support is acquired, and the continued support of MARC past June of 2014 is tenuous. BACS certainly hopes that the relationship with MARC will continue, but they also recognize that there are large changes moving through the government social support programs and BACS is looking to assume more of the financial responsibility for the Senior Program if necessary. Will you assist in helping? We are in need of monetary donations and endowments to be able to move this vision forward. With the 501(c)(3) status an individual is now able to take a tax deduction from their annual tax return by donating to the entity that is supporting the seniors of our area. This spring's deadly tornado in Moore, OK, summer flooding in the Midwest, and the not-so-distant Hurricane Sandy which struck the Eastern Seaboard in 2012, demonstrate that disasters can happen anywhere at any time.

This year's National Preparedness Month campaign slogan, "You Can Be the Hero", seeks to transform awareness into action by encouraging all Americans to be the heroes in their own homes, businesses, schools and other common places, taking the necessary steps to ensure their communities and the people within those communities are prepared for emergencies of all kinds.

Localizing the national theme with an emphasis on issues true to the Nation's Heartland, FEMA Region VII will launch its regional campaign, Be A Hero, Preparing Means Caring, in conjunction with National Preparedness Month. The initiative includes extensive outreach throughout the Region VII states of Iowa, Missouri, Kansas and Nebraska.

Freeman said "Our goal in adopting a regional focus for National Preparedness Month is to promote the importance of taking an inclusive approach to disaster preparedness because everyone, regardless of abilities, has something to offer when it comes to preparedness.

"We can be heroes by learning what it takes to prepare, by understanding the variety and complexity of needs in our communities – particularly for people with access or functional needs and to ensure the well-being of pets – and by exercising a few simple activities now to ensure everyone within our community circles is prepared."

Through FEMA Region VII's Be A Hero, Preparing Means Caring campaign, information will be distributed on a variety of topics and issues to consider when practicing preparedness including: caring for the elderly and those with disabilities, ensuring your business is resilient and accessible, and building an emergency supply kit to care for pets.

As the baseline for all FEMA emergency preparedness information, the campaign focuses on starting preparedness with four simple steps:

1. Be informed about emergencies that could happen in your community, and identify sources of local information that will be helpful before, during and after an emergency.

- 2. Make a plan for what to do in an emergency.
- 3. Build an emergency supply kit.
- 4. Get involved.

Although a majority of the Campaign's information and outreach will be distributed throughout National Preparedness Month in September, FEMA Region VII is using the initiative as a kick-off effort to taking a more focused, long-term approach to engaging with citizens and community partners throughout the year."

Preparedness is a shared responsibility; it takes a whole community. 

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


















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
