Winter/Holiday safety

The winter holidays are a time for celebration, and that means more cooking, home decorating, entertaining, and an increased risk of fire due to heating equipment.

Holiday decorating and lighting

Use caution with holiday decorations and whenever possible, choose those made with flame-resistant, flame-retardant or non-combustible materials.

Keep candles away from decoration and other combustible materials, and do not use candles to decorate Christmas trees

Purchase only lights and electrical decorations bearing the name of and independent testing lab, and follow the manufacture's instructions for installation and maintenance.

Carefully inspect new and previously used light strings and replace damaged items before plugging lights in. do not overload extension cords.

Check your strands of lights to determine the number of strands that may be connected. Connect no more than three stands of push-in bulbs and a maximum of 50 bulbs for screw-in bulbs.

Always unplug lights before replacing light bulbs or fuses.

Don't mount lights in any way that can damage the cord's wire insulation Keep children and pets away from light strings and electrical decorations

Turn off all light strings and decorations before leaving the house or going to bed.

Holiday entertaining

Unattended cooking is the leading cause of home fires in the U.S. When cooking for holiday visitors, remember to keep an eye on the range.

If you smoke, please do it outside

Wherever you smoke, provide plenty of large, deep ashtrays and check them frequently. Cigarette butts can smolder in the trash and cause a fire, so completely douse cigarette butts with water before discarding.

After a party, always check on, between and under upholstery and cushions and inside trash cans for cigarette butts that may be smoldering.

Keep matches and lighters up high, out of sight and reach of children.(preferably in a locked cabinet). When smokers visit your home, ask them to keep their smoking materials with them so young children do not touch them.

Test your smoke alarms, and let guest know what your fire escape plan is.



- There is more than a traditional shoulder mount available including a free standing pedestal mount, a European mount, an antler plaque, a tanned hide, and many other options to fit your budget. So ask for the price and what options are available.
- Ask how much money is required for a deposit. taxidermists do not charge the full amount up front giving you time before the total amount is due. The average time to complete a mount can vary, but usually ranges from 6 months to 12 months or longer.
- Ask to stop by their shop and take a look at the work. Do the eyes look alive? Are the ear edges crisp and sharp? Basically, do the mounts look like the animal did before you harvested it? Would you be happy looking and showing off this mount?
- taxidermists Some happily cape your deer at no cost so it can go from your truck to their

shop, saving you time and money. If you plan to cape it yourself, ask the taxidermist the best way to go about it to ensure you have the hide to complete the mount you want. Prices start to go up if you damage the cape or have to purchase a different one. When in doubt call and talk to your taxidermist. They are always happy to talk to you about your specific wants and needs. When you arrive with your harvest, be prepared to have your permit number and confirmation number with the required deposit. Taxidermists will not accept a harvest

A Reminiscence of Buckner

I was passing through downtown Buckner a few weeks ago and saw some workmen busy on the roof of the former restaurant/tavern on the east side of the street. I thought it was good they were repairing the roof; perhaps for a new tenant. Then I passed through a few days later and saw the entire building had been demolished and hauled away. The crew I saw on the roof was actually a salvage crew and not a repair crew. I realized yet another building was gone. As I was driving away from downtown, I recalled some of the history of the building. When I moved to Buckner in 1959 as a 1st grader, the building was very "important", as it was Buckner's movie theater. The seats were ancient even in 1959, but it was what it was. I don't remember the theater being open on a regular basis, but I certainly remember some Saturday matinee movies. My friends and I would gather at show time. It was usually a good experience and we got to see something in color too! Color TV's were few and far between, and the color quality of the early 1960's was

I would guess the movies were at the end of their run by the time they reached town. And they were always preceded by a cartoon or two and a Three Stooges short film. As I found out in later years many small town theaters were at the end **Editors Note: Thank you so much Jim** runs of movies. The movie distributors for sharing with us! often did not want to pay return shipping,

and as a consequence the little theaters often had a small library of movies that were never returned. I believe this was the reason there was always a Three Stooges short film available.

The next life for the building was housing a motorcycle shop. In the late 1960's the motocross and hill climbing fad had hit the area. There was a private hill climbing park near Sibley that was popular with hill climbing enthusiasts throughout the region. The shop specialized in hill climbing machines and in the years before the Japanese companies hit the shores, some of the best motocross/hill climbing cycles came from Europe and in particular Spain. I remember the shop sold two brands at the time, and both from Spain, Bultaco and Maico. They seemed to be fine machines for that sport. I think the same shop owner "Vic" stayed in place when hill climbing faded away and changed his shop to support dune buggies based on Volkswagen drive trains. Vic's then moved about half a block from the downtown building to the former Lasater Ford dealership. The building was vacant for sometime before it was converted to a restaurant/ tavern at its last run. It was sad to see the old building go, but I have my good memories of it and small town life, and that will have to suffice.


Students selected are: Rachel E.(7)—clarinet, 16th chair

The Fort Osage High School Cheerleading Competition squad came home with a 1st place trophy for their division. Congratulations





Parents, do not forget your cameras! All ages. Registration is required.


