

The City of Buckner is replacing the old sidewalks in downtown sidewalks replaced and they look great.



Quantrill-related biography complements 140-year-old predecessor By David W. Jackson The Orderly Pack Rat October 20, 2014

Blue Springs, MO. The Orderly Pack Rat today released a major biography complementing five preceding chronicles of Civil War-era Confederate Capt. William Clarke Quantrill that date back nearly 140-years-ago. This is the first-ever biography of the infamous guerrilla's wife, Kate King, published to commemorate the 85th anniversary of her death and mysterious burial.

Quantrill was, perhaps, the Confederacy's number one persona-non-grata, most famous for leading the 1863 charge to burn Lawrence, KS, and massacre many of its male inhabitants (in retaliation, it should be noted, for a host of prior atrocities against Missourians in the border conflicts between Kansas and Missouri). John N. Edwards published Noted Guerrillas in 1877 the first biography of Quantrill, which was followed nearly 35 years later in 1910 by William E. Connelley's Quantrill and the Border Wars. First-time co-authors Virgil D. Hoftiezer, Ph.D., and Vicki P. Beck introduce their 2014 release of KATE In Fact and Fiction to document the Life and Legend of Sarah Catherine "Kate" (King) Quantrill-Evans-Batson-Head, aka. Kate Clarke.

The author's 20-year collaboration introduces 13-year-old Sarah Catherine King, who defied her parent's orders and soon ran-off their Blue Springs, Jackson County, MO, homestead with the dashing Quantrill. From the outset of the Civil War—that had been mounting along the Missouri-Kansas border since 1854—Quantrill and "Kate" were the quintessential 'star-crossed lovers' who were said to have eventually eloped. Kate was recognized by Quantrill's followers, though no historian has yet uncovered a marriage record. They traveled as "Capt.

and Mrs. William Clarke." And, after Quantrill was murdered in 1865, Kate continued to live an independent life as "Kate Clarke." Co-author Vicki P. Beck said, "She was a remarkable woman."

Quantrill-related biography complements 140-year-old predecessor, page 2 of 2 Kate was at Quantrill's deathbed in a Louisville, KY, hospital, and stood at his original gravesite (Quantrill's bones would later be dug-up, disbursed, and reburied in two separate graves in the 1990s

... fodder for an entire book itself). To survive, Kate returned in mourning to St. Louis, MO, where she had lived in refuge, and began or continued a life of prostitution, quickly becoming a well-known madam for more than a decade. Modern-day Busch Stadium is the exact site where Kate Clarke's house of "social-evil" was located.

Fast forward 60 years and two surnames later when Kate, then known as Sarah C. Head, ended up back in her hometown of Blue Springs, MO. Kate died at the Jackson County Poor Farm in near complete anonymity. Her pauper gravesite, obscured for decades, is now documented and marked thanks to Hoftiezer, a King descendant, and long-time Quantrill historian Donald R. Hale.


Co-author, Virgil Hoftiezer, writes, "Kate's story is an enigma buried in the cloak of history, a mystery with a sad ending, a story waiting to be told." For the rest of Kate's full, true-life story, "you gotta buy the book!" he added.

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Union Pacific shares its commitment to public safety

Each year prior to and during harvest, all agriculture professionals are reminded to be aware and practice safe driving procedures when bringing in their crops. Many fields are adjacent to Union Pacific Railroad tracks and producers often use private railroad crossings to travel from field to field. Union Pacific urges producers to stay safe when crossing the tracks while they are working in the fields during this year's harvest.

According to the Federal Railroad Administration, 250 people died and 943 were injured in 2013 as a result of grade crossing incidents across the United States.

Union Pacific shares its commitment to public safety through various channels such as community events, media outreach, law enforcement partnerships and collaboration with Operation Lifesaver. The UP CARES (Union Pacific Crossing Accident Reduction Education and Safety) public safety initiative brings together communities in a collaborative and caring effort to promote railroad grade crossing and pedestrian safety.

"As agriculture producers harvest their crops this year, we want to remind them to approach railroad crossings with caution and take the extra time to be sure a train is not near because you never know when a train will come along," said Robert Morrison, Union Pacific Chief of Police.

To increase awareness of railroad safety during harvest, Union Pacific safety team members have provided elevator operators in Nebraska with grade crossing safety information in the form of a visor card that is attached to a weigh scale ticket holder. Drivers are then given the safety information when they receive their weigh ticket.

"It can take a mile or more to stop a train and by the time a locomotive engineer sees you on the track, it would be too late," said Lawrence Wenko, Union Pacific director – Public Safety.

"Locomotives and rail cars overhang the tracks by at least three feet on either side of the rail and loose straps hanging from rail cars may extend even further. If your combine or tractor are too close to the tracks, you can be hit by the locomotive or a rail car," added Wenko.

Union Pacific has reduced grade crossing accident rates by 15 percent from 2003 - 2013. UP CARES initiatives promote pedestrian and driver safety through a variety of outreach efforts:

Grade crossing education and enforcement, during which motorists violating rail crossing signage and laws are educated about the dangers of such actions. Related "positive enforcement" initiatives reward drivers who operate safely at grade crossings.

Safety trains, which host local law enforcement, media and public officials and provide them the opportunity to ride in the locomotive cab and see traffic violations from a locomotive engineer's point of view. This activity also allows Union Pacific to connect with community leaders and help them better understand the railroad's focus on safety.

Communication blitzes, which educate the public via community events, media outreach and paid advertising. Media outreach coincides with safety trains in UP communities.

Do not become a railroad statistic; use caution when approaching and crossing railroad tracks this harvest.

The tax rate in the Fort Osage R-1 School District will increase by ten cents for the tax year. This increase in the current school tax levy is the direct result of a drop in assessed valuation (AV). The following are the assessed valuation figures from the past seven years:

In sharing information with the Board of Education regarding our assessed valuation, Dr. Mark Enderle, Superintendent of Schools, said, "Our valuation increased every year from 1994 to 2008. Even with modest 2% annual growth, our AV should be about \$315,000,000 right now instead of \$256,106.755. Eventually this will bounce back, but it looks like it's going to be a long, hard slog."

The Fort Osage Board of Education met on September 30, 2014 at 7:30 a.m. in a public hearing and set this year's tax rate at \$5.6998 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

The tax rate breaks down as follows:

Special Fund \$2.6898 General Fund \$1.8600 Debt Service Fund \$1.1500
